### WHERE HISTORY IS WRITTEN ////

From March 5th to 9th, Daniel served in Kajokeji, located in the south of South Sudan, a region devastated by civil war. Participants traveled far and wide to attend the leadership conference. Some journeyed up to 100 miles to be part of the conference, with some coming from Uganda, where many South Sudanese refugees are still residing. Uganda has provided refuge to those affected by the civil war. Tens of thousands live in refugee settlements there.

Only slowly are the refugees beginning to return to their homeland. Kajokeji has the feel of an abandoned Western town, like something out of a movie, with a dusty main street and side roads that seem to lead nowhere. Destroyed or abandoned buildings shape the cityscape.

Fighters had looted and removed window frames and metal sheets from the roofs to sell for money. Evangelist Enoka, the host of the conference, shared how someone had tried to steal metal sheets from the church roof. The thief fell and lost his life, putting an end to the looting on the premises.

In Kajokeji, people are few and far between, but life is slowly returning. The people are tired of constantly fleeing from armed soldiers, and some have decided to stay in their village, come what may.

God brought you here in a very difficult time as a prophet to bring healing and restoration. The civil war has left death, trauma, grief, and widespread material devastation. Sadly, the conflict still smolders. One morning during the conference, the district security officer, also a Christian, came to brief the leaders on the current situation. Just 24 miles away, there had been an incident. A barracks was

attacked by armed fighters, leading to a gunfight. One soldier was killed, and a civilian woman was burned alive in the house. Horrific!

The district commissioner, who was supposed to honor the conference with his presence, arrived late due to the situation and reported that he had sent soldiers to the scene. The attackers had already fled. All clear!









# A CHARRED TREE THAT BLOOMS ////

South Sudan has a unique beauty. In this region, it is common practice to burn the grass in the fields, leaving behind pitch-black landscapes. Yet soon, fresh green plants begin to sprout, and beautiful flowers emerge from the black ashes. Unfortunately, many trees are also affected by the fires, left partially burned or charred. One particular type of trees caught my attention-though scorched by the bushfire and without leaves, it still blooms in a bright orange. What a metaphor of the situation in South Sudan! The "fires of war" have left behind scorched earth, but life is still there! The Church of God is beginning to bloom again because it is deeply rooted in Christ, as I would soon

Exciting days lay ahead in Kajokeji. The flight in a small Cessna and the scorching heat were absolutely worth it. Despite the intense temperatures, leaders traveled to the conference in this war-affected region. At times people in this region travel up to 50 miles, either by bicycle or on foot. One of the attendees was Apollo, an old, frail man who had started and led the revival movement many years ago. Surprisingly, he had made the journey. A tireless preacher of the Gospel, he had even been imprisoned for his faith. He had sold his rooster just to afford the trip to the conference. He asked me to send greetings and to tell my friends about the struggles in South Sudan.

The deep pain of this war-torn region became especially evident during the Sunday service. A young girl, who was leading a small singing group, wanted to share a few words but broke down in tears-her friends and the parents of the children in the choir had fled and were now scattered.

The Christians in Kajokeji are warm and kind-hearted people. They greet with enthusiastic waves and have a unique revival dance that involves constant handshaking. And yet, a gray veil hangs over everything the suffering of the people runs deep.

All the more, I was encouraged by the positive feedback from the conference participants. The leader of the revival movement in a refugee camp just across the border in Uganda said, "Your words will reach and have an impact. Do not forget us when you return." Another leader said, "Our spirit has been awakened through your words."

Refreshed and strengthened, the participants returned home, ready for a new revival movement. It was an honor to meet these brothers and sisters who continue to faithfully serve the Lord despite difficult circumstances. There is hope for South Sudan!

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Despite the intense heat, the participants gathered to hear from the evangelist and other speakers. Addressing the nation's critical condition, Daniel shared messages on revival, discipleship, and healing. His messages left a lasting impact. On Friday, the evangelist laid hands on the participants, and the Holy Spirit moved powerfully among the leaders, releasing anointing and revival.

During the breaks, heaps of porridge—a blend of cassava roots and sorghum—were consumed. The mango trees on the grounds provided much-needed shade.



### THE TRUE GOSPEL ////

From January 23rd to 26th, Evangelist Daniel Schott preached in Maswa, Tanzania. The journey was arduous, with the final stretch being mostly on unpaved roads.

The local pastors' association came together to invite the German evangelist. Over four evenings, Daniel preached the Gospel and three days were dedicated to morning seminars. The Holy Spirit moved powerfully in Maswa that weekend.

The visitors experienced the forgiveness of sins and a number of them—for the first time—decided to follow Jesus. A few hundred were healed during the weekend, even from long-term illnesses. Among them was a man who was healed of stomach issues after many hospital visits and 28 years of suffering.

At the end of the evangelistic meetings, a young man came on stage with the flag of Maswa to announce that God was healing Maswa. The events were broadcast live on regional television in the Simiyu Region. The pastors in Maswa were grateful and excited about the "true Gospel" preached by the German evangelist and invited him to return.





## AGONGO-ONE UPON ANOTHER ////

Migori County, in the southwest of Kenya, is the second poorest county in the country. The main source of income is sugarcane farming, which is harvested year-round.

In February, Evangelist Schott traveled to the village of Agongo to preach at the leadership conference and revival meetings. Far from the main road, a dirt road leads up to a hill. A large ministry center is located there, which includes a school and an impressive church building. For four days, Christians and leaders from the region gathered here to be trained and revived. Daniel called the participants to repentance and a life fully devoted to God. People streamed to the altar to receive forgiveness of sins and experienced the power of the Holy Spirit. Around 200 people were healed, testimonies followed.

Agongo, the name of the village, means "one upon another" and refers to the large boulders in the area that are piled on top of one another. One of these rock formations formed a cave, which was used by "rainmakers" until 19 years ago, who sought to summon rain during droughts. Bishop Amonde, the host of the event, along with Evangelist Schott and other believers, visited this special place. Today, it has become a place of prayer and is known well beyond the region as the *Agongo Prayer Cave*. These are great conditions for a revival.

On Sunday afternoon, Daniel preached at an open-air event in Migori, the nearest major town. The Lord touched the Christian leaders, and it was moving to see believers kneeling publicly, crying out to God for forgiveness and revival in their land. This is how revival begins!
